

CANADIAN MAPLE PRODUCTION

- Canada produces 71 percent of the maple syrup sold in the world, 91 percent of which is produced in Quebec.
- Canada's Amerindian people taught the early settlers how to harvest and boil sap to make maple syrup. Now enjoyed in over 50 countries around the world, pure Canadian maple syrup products range from traditional maple syrup to maple water, maple sugar, maple butter and maple candy.
- While Quebec is the primary maple-producing region in the world, other regions in Canada, such as Ontario, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, also produce maple syrup.
- In Quebec, there are more than 7,300 maple syrup sugar houses that produce millions of gallons of pure syrup each year. For instance, more than **148 million pounds** were produced in 2016, a record-shattering year.
- More than 80 percent of Quebec's maple syrup is exported to 53 countries.
- The U.S. is the largest export market for maple syrup from Canada. In 2015, over 59 million lbs. were exported to the U.S.
